Dear Donors & Friends.

Incredible things happen when people come together to support foundational skills that shape lives. Together we have made a positive impact locally and statewide in 2023, helping individuals of all ages improve their literacy through work centered on our mission.*

Over the last year, much has been accomplished through our continued partnership with the Northern Michigan University Center for Rural Health. We completed our second year as part of the National Rural Health Essay Contest encouraging high school age youth across the U.P. to discuss health topics. In addition, an Oral Health Literacy Initiative also has continued to educate various elementary students on the importance of dental hygiene using the book, *Curious George Goes to the Dentist*. This fun and unique project has not only inspired many children, but generated seeds of interest in other communities as well. We've also just begun a "Words Matter" project involving students at NMU exploring the impact of words on student efforts to seek out information to educate themselves on the flu vaccine. Stay tuned in 2024 for exciting updates!

LLF Michigan also continues to support Wayne State University students in a graduate or undergraduate program in teacher education. With a combination of LLF Michigan funds, including direct donor contributions to WSU, \$20,550 has been awarded to date to students through the fall 2023/spring 2024 academic year.

Our beloved Dolly Parton's Imagination Library continues to provide meaningful opportunities for families to read together and for children to explore literacy skills of reading, writing, listening, speaking, and thinking. We are providing books to enrolled children 0-5 years old in five communities through the tireless work of LLF Michigan leadership, volunteers, contracted support and donors like you. For example, more than 260 Marquette children benefited monthly from this program in 2023.

Our Legacy Grant to the Lowell Area Historical Museum continues annually. This immersion program includes all third-grade classes in the district and has received regional recognition.

The Bertha's Buddies correspondence project, initiated in 2021, continues to touch the lives of those adults who may receive limited correspondence. Cards were sent throughout the state two times this past year with a special message creating connection for 79 recipients.

Inspiring the Imagination

DOLLY PARTON'S IMAGINATION LIBRARY

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library is a book gifting program that mails one new book per month to each child from birth to age five with no cost, obligation, or income requirement for the child's family. All preschool age children (birth to age 5) in the community are eligible to receive one ageappropriate book monthly in the mail addressed to the child while enrolled in the program. Parents or guardians must register online or submit an official registration form completed by an authorized adult to enroll the child in the program. The Dollywood Foundation is responsible for selecting, processing, mailing and managing the distribution of over 2.8 million books a month throughout the United States and four other countries.

The Literacy Legacy Fund of Michigan is the Program Partner (aka Affiliate) for several Dolly Parton's Imagination Library programs in Marquette and Alger Counties. It is both the Program Partner, and Local Champion and Sponsor, for Marquette 49855. In the Marquette 49855 area, LLF Michigan is responsible for paying \$26 per child annually for the cost of the books and their mailing, maintaining the database, and marketing the program. Many fundraising initiatives including donor mailings and annual poster are used to help raise funds for this program. At this time, it is serving an estimated 260 children annually by ensuring free books in Marquette 49855.

LLF Michigan also provides guidance and support to other programs in the U.P. under its oversight. In addition to Marquette 49855, current programs with LLF Michigan as the Program Partner include:

WAYNE STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIP IN HONOR OF DR. JACQUELINE TILLES

Dr. Tilles's love of reading started before she was old enough to go to school. In order to fulfill her desire of learning to read, she had to change schools at age five. Persistence paid off; she never let go of her Mama's promise that in school they will teach you to read. That promise was so powerful that it provided a foundation for her life - a foundation that continues to this very day. Dr. Tilles became an elementary school reading teacher, a middle school English teacher, and an Associate Professor of English Education, Reading, Language, and Literature at Wayne State University. We are proud to honor Dr. Tilles through this scholarship.

Our 2023 recipients are Brianna Coffman who is pursuing a master's degree in Elementary Education with a major in Social Studies and Mariela N-Tyler who is pursuing a master's in Secondary Education with a major in Spanish. Since 2016, this scholarship has provided 14 students with financial assistance. Through the fall 2023/spring 2024 academic year, a total of \$20,550 in scholarships has been awarded by donors and LLF Michigan combined to date.

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MUSEUM IMMERSION PROGRAM

The Lowell Area Historical Museum was awarded a Legacy Grant for its "Museum Immersion" Program. The program includes all third-grade classes in the Lowell Area School District. Objectives met by the program: 1) Support, expand and supplement social studies curriculum through direct exposure to historical artifacts, exhibits, techniques and interaction with local historians; 2) Connect learning in the classroom to the local community; 3) Model methods of historical research and writing through student-driven activities during their time in the museum with the guidance of historians. This program has been very successful and has consistently made adjustments to inperson learning with the supplementation of videos and activity ideas. LLF Michigan has provided financial support for four consecutive years.

MRA CONFERENCE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR NEW TEACHERS

Michigan teachers in their first five years of work received an opportunity to apply for funding to attend the Michigan Reading Association Annual Conference in Grand Rapids, Michigan, March 2023. Funds were made available through LLF Michigan and MEEMIC Insurance Company. The funding covers reimbursement up to \$500 for conference registration, hotel accommodations, and MRA membership.



Applicants wrote a 300-word or less essay on how they would implement what they learned at the conference. Multiple grant readers unanimously chose the top applicants from the many deserving applications received.

Following the conference, each grant recipient wrote a summary of their conference experience. It was clear, as we read each summary, that the conference information will have a great impact on not only the new teachers, but also the educators' students for many years to come.

ORAL HEALTH LITERACY INITIATIVE

In celebration of National Reading Month, the Northern Michigan University Center for Rural Health and students, currently enrolled in the pre-dental academic track at Northern Michigan University, joined forces to read and engage with youth in an effort to increase awareness and education about proper oral hygiene. The project was made possible through funding from LLF Michigan, Delta Dental Foundation, Upper Peninsula Health Plan, and Superior Dental Care. The project targeted second and third grade students at K.I. Sawyer Elementary in Gwinn Area Community Schools, Aspen Ridge Elementary in N.I.C.E. Community Schools, and Mather Elementary School in Munising Public Schools. Approximately 350 elementary students were served by the project.

RURAL LIBRARY BOOK DISTRIBUTION

Literacy Legacy Fund of Michigan donated new hardcover books to various rural libraries throughout Upper and Lower Michigan as part of an extended Giving Tuesday celebration. Libraries were able to choose between a copy of Michigan-based author Thelma Godin's children's book, *Hush-a-Bye Night: Goodnight Lake Superior* and *The First Notes: The Story of Do, Re, Mi* written by award-winning actress, singer, and author, Julie Andrews and daughter, author, Emma Walton Hamilton.

Twenty books were distributed to various rural libraries by various LLF Michigan leadership in Marquette, Alger, Kent, and Presque Isle counties. Libraries included AuTrain Onota Public Schools Library, Burt Township School Library, Forsyth Township Public Library, Ishpeming Carnegie Public Library, Kent District Library - Alto Branch, Kent District Library - Caledonia Township Branch, Kent District Library - Englehardt (Lowell) Branch, Munising School Public Library, Negaunee Public Library, Powell Township School Library, Presque Isle District Library, Presque Isle Library - Grand Lake, Presque Isle Library – Millersburg, Presque Isle Library – Onaway, and Presque Isle Library – Posen, Republic Michigamme School Public Library, Richmond Township Library, Superior Central School Library, and Wells Township School Library, Peter White Public Library in Marquette.

BERTHA'S BUDDIES CORRESPONDENCE PROGRAM

Bertha's Buddies is a special correspondence project sponsored by the Literacy Legacy Fund of Michigan. The intent is to bring joy into the lives of adults, usually, but not limited to senior citizens who may not receive an abundance of personal mail during the year.

Two special mailings were conducted in 2023 featuring cheerful cards with stickers and a positive message. Each card notes the person recommending the recipient to receive a card. LLF Michigan encourages the community to nominate those who may benefit from such correspondence by reaching out to the LLF Michigan office.

This project, launched by the Board in February 2021, was initiated in memory of Bertha Wiseman, mother of the LLF Michigan founder. Bertha loved to send cards to those who were often alone, and she enjoyed receiving cards as well.
